BIOL 190L: 49196 EMHS-525	2/5 – 5/30/18 M/W	5:30 – 6:55pm	Biology 190 Lab: Laboratory experiments emphasizing basic concepts needed for entry-level employment in the bioscience industry. Topics include chemistry of buffers, metrology, biological molecules, gene expression, cell structure, and molecular biology techniques.
