# **Child Abduction Prevention**

Keeping kids safe is a top priority for parents, educators, and community members. In Orange County, there are resources available to help us educate and protect our children from harm. One excellent resource to help get the conversation on safety started is the child abduction prevention bookmarks created by the Joyful Child Foundation which are available at www.joyful-child.org. The bookmarks share abuse and abduction prevention tips for children and have been distributed to all Orange County elementary school students through the collaborative efforts of the Joyful Child Foundation, Orange County Sheriff's Department, and Orange County Department of Education.

People who may pose a threat to children often give signals or demonstrate behaviors that can serve as warnings. If a child knows the warning signs, they will know when they are in an unsafe situation and what action to take. The key to discussing safety with your child is establishing good communication throughout your daily lives. Effective communication as a parent requires active listening and asking questions. As you introduce topics, begin to talk about different ideas and rules surrounding safety. The goal is to share knowledge that will empower children to feel confident and to trust their instincts, while being aware of their surroundings. Practice the lessons by role-playing with your children to help them put what they have learned into action.

Part of ensuring a world class education where every student succeeds involves keeping kids safe as a top priority. It is through cooperative efforts to communicate openly and provide tools for our children that we, as educators and members of the community, work together to create a stronger and safer society.

# Go Green!

# Carbon-1, Oxygen-2

This title sounds more like a sports score than a call to Go Green! Carbon was identified as the currency of energy flow in any ecosystem—our world for one—in our last column, Recycling Nutrient Cycling. The carbon cycle as it fuels our lives is depicted in the following two examples.

Inside the leaves of the orange tree in my backyard, inorganic carbon in atmospheric carbon dioxide (one carbon atom bonded to two oxygen atoms, CO2) is "energized" by the sun's rays and converted to organic carbon in sugars which accumulate in the fruit. I picked, then manually squeezed, 15 oranges into juice

this morning, which my family drank with breakfast. Through many transformations, my body extracted the sun's energy captured by the orange tree allowing my fingers to type these words. In giving up its energy, the carbon is oxidized back to carbon dioxide and exhaled into the air. The carbon so cycled from the atmosphere to the biosphere (first the orange tree, then me), back to the atmosphere took about four months.

A blade of pasture grass in the Central Valley captures the sun's rays and "energizes" carbon dioxide in the same way as my orange tree. The organic carbon formed in the blade of grass is stored primarily as cellulose not sugars. Using different farm implements, all gasoline powered, the owner of the pasture first cuts the grass, then turns it for drying once, twice, three times before baling it. These bales are delivered on a flat-bed tractor trailer to a feedlot in the Inland Empire. Cellulose isn't easily digested by most animals, cows being a notable exception. Cows have four stomachs populated by a diversity of microorganisms that allow most of the organic carbon in cellulose to be taken up by the cow (a lot of it escapes as every cow passes about 53 gallons of methane gas per day). The cow stores the carbon as proteins and fats. Ultimately, in two to five years, the cow is cut up into steaks, which are delivered to the local grocery store by truck. John Q. Public drives his car to the grocery store, buys a steak, drives home, barbeques the steak on his grill fired by propane he had to drive to the local gas station to purchase, and finally eats the carbon originally captured by the blade of grass in a pasture far, far away. The energy in this carbon allows Mr. Public to exercise a Stairmaster at a gym he has to drive to.

Burning a gallon of gasoline emits about 20 pounds of CO2 into the atmosphere. Minimizing "carbon footprint" is synonymous with our quest to Go Green! "Carbon footprint" equals the amount of CO2 discharged burning fossil fuels in support of our living our lives, not the CO2 we exhale as a function of life. In the two energy attainment examples, the first uses no fossil fuels, whereas the second burns gas at every turn. Going green means living with less fossil fuels.

# **Students Launch Attendance Campaign**

Students enrolled in "The Art of Graphic Design," an A-G approved ROP class at Orange High School, have launched an unprecedented student-run marketing campaign to promote student attendance.

The idea for the campaign, entitled "Be The Change," started during a class project to brand their school. The students discovered an odd contradiction: the level of school pride is counter-balanced by a lack of material items such as books, computers and other learning tools.

With this in mind, the branding project turned into a campaign aimed at drawing attention to the fact that every time a student skips class, their school loses \$265 per day. This could otherwise be used for books, computers and oncampus maintenance

From the initial step, the graphics students decided to lead by example. Led by their instructor, Ed Hansbury, they have created a series of assorted campaigns to shock, engage and begin the process of change.

An example is the posting of 7,000 notes around the campus with "Be The Change" written on them, and creating podcasts to empower students across the country, with an accompanying series of hand-drawn posters.

The students also participated in two open and honest Town Hall meetings with Orange High School Principal SK Johnson and Orange Unified Superintendent Dr. Godley. More information about this unique campaign can be viewed at www.designorange.org.

Finally, we have four students turning 22 this year and will move on to county adult programs. We have grown attached to these students and will miss them. They have been part of our family for many years.

# **Global Citizenship**




### **Beyond the Call of Duty**


Students will earn SOAR tickets for demonstrating such behav-

# **Grade Level Targets Hit the Mark at VPE**

Here at VPE our teachers worked collaboratively in grade levels earlier this year to establish grade level academic targets in both language arts and mathematics. These targets are goals that are measured throughout the year and compared to benchmarks that grade levels individually established. Grade levels were free to decide what area to focus on.

To date, students in all grade levels have made significant progress. Listed below are the grade level areas of focus and year end goals for language arts.:

Kindergarten-Language Arts target area: Sound Segmenting. Goal: 80% of all students will pass.

Grade 1-Language Arts target area: High Frequency words

Goal: 90% of students will score 95% or better. The remaining students will show measurable growth.

Grade 2-Language Arts target area: Reading Comprehension

Goal: 80% of the grade level will be at Proficient or higher in SRI. The other 20% will show measurable growth.

**Grade 3**–Language Arts target area: Reading Comprehension

Goal: Students will score an average of 70% or higher on the four SRI tests.

Grade 4-Language Arts target area: Reading Comprehension

Goal: 75% of fourth-graders will score proficient or higher. The remaining students will show measurable growth.

Grade 5-Language Arts target area: Reading Comprehension

Goal: 74% Proficient. The remaining students will show measurable growth.

Grade 6-Language Arts target area: Reading Comprehension

Goal: 100% of the students will increase their score at least 6%.


# **Another Great Year**
